The author gives you clues about the main idea, but doesn't tell you directly.




Finding the implicit main idea is like going on a treasure hunt. You need to look for clues.

In the garden, bees buzz from flower to flower, collecting nectar. The leaves rustle gently in the breeze, while a butterfly flutters by. Under the sun, everything seems to be moving and alive, creating a symphony of nature's sounds.



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
A butterfly starts as a tiny egg. After that, a larva hatches from the egg. This larva is called a caterpillar. Caterpillars eat a lot of food and grow very quickly. Next, a caterpillar finds a place to attach itself and begins to grow a chrysalis. The caterpillar now becomes a pupa. During this stage wings begin to grow. Last, the adult butterfly breaks out of the chrysalis. This cycle will begin again when the butterfly lays eggs.


