Betsy Ross was born on January 1, 1752. Her birth name was Elizabeth, but she went by Betsy. After she finished school, Betsy became an apprentice (someone who works for a skilled person to learn a trade) in a sewing shop. She learned all about sewing. Betsy was an amazing seamstress.

One day, Betsy met John Ross. Her Quaker family did not support her relationship with John because he belonged to a different church. Her family cut her off. Betsy and John were married anyway. She joined John's church.

They started an upholstery, or sewing, business. The Revolutionary War started in America soon after. The war made it hard for the business to get fabric. The business was not doing well. With their business struggling, John joined the war. In January 1776, he was hit by an explosion. He died days later.

Later that year, Betsy met three men. They were named George Washington, George Ross, and Robert Morris. The men asked her to sew a flag. George Washington showed her a design for the flag. It was magnificent. According to Betsy, the flag was finished by June 1776. In July, the Declaration of Independence was signed. A nation was born: America. The flag is still a symbol of national unity and pride.

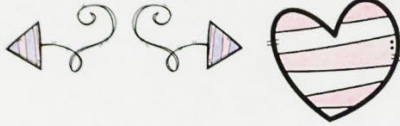

Keep in mind when using any leveled text that many students will need scaffolding and support to reach text at the high end of their grade band. According to Appendix A of the Common Core Standards, "It is important to recognize that scaffolding often is entirely appropriate. The expectation that scaffolding will occur with particularly challenging texts is built into the Standards' grade-by-grade text complexity expectations, for example. The general movement, however, should be toward decreasing scaffolding and increasing independence both within and across the text complexity bands defined in the Standards."

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How to Teach Fact vs. Opinion

Model

Tell students an opinion statement such as, "I HATE chocolate!"

Ask students how they feel about chocolate. Tell students that these are opinions because they are something that you think, feel, or believe.

Tell students, "Chocolate comes from a fruit tree. It is made from a seed." Explain that this is a fact because it can be proven true and is based on science.

Introduce the Fact vs. Opinion anchor chart. Ask students to come up with their own examples of facts and opinions.

When students are stuck, ask them, "Is it what someone thinks, feels, or believes? Or can it be proven true or false?"

Work as a class or in partners to complete the fact and opinion sort.

Visuals

- Create an anchor chart displaying the difference between fact and opinion.
- Students go on a scavenger hunt to find examples of facts and opinions in their books.
- Students use the fact vs. opinion books while reading independently.

Differentiation

- Model determining the difference between fact and opinion while previewing read aloud books.
- Students who struggle with this skill may need more exposure to nonfiction books. Provide many opportunities for nonfiction reading and noticing text features.

The Birth of a Video Game

We can all agree that video games are awesome and everyone loves to play them. But have you ever thought about how your favorite video game was created? How a video game was developed depends on the specific game, but the basic process is the same for most games. Making a video game is a complicated task that is interesting.



A video game begins with an idea. Ideas can come from well-known stories, characters, or may be imagined. Next, a preproduction team is formed. This team usually includes a director, designer, engineer, artist, and writer. Each member is important. The team writes the game's story and how it will work. They decide how the game will be played and what technology will be needed.

Next, the artist sketches storyboards, which describe each scene in the game. Then, designers map out each level of play, including all of the different worlds a player will advance through in the game.

After the storyboards and game designs are complete, production begins. Engineers and computer programmers write "code," or a language that computers understand. Some animated games use 3D models. Finally, the game's outline is now ready. With the basics of the game set, the production team tries to make it perfect and special effects are added.

After production is finished, the game goes to postproduction. Users test the first version, and the engineer uses technology to fix issues. The purpose is to make the product as good as possible. Now the final product is ready to be released, and the game can be bought in stores and online. Many people see this as the beginning of a game's life, but little do they know it's actually the middle of a long journey!

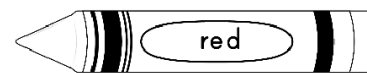
