

The Lexile Framework[®] for Reading measures are scientific, quantitative text levels. When the Lexile of a text is measured, specific, measurable attributes of the text are considered, including, but not limited to, word frequency, sentence length, and text cohesion. These are difficult attributes for humans to evaluate, so a computer measures them.

Common Core State Standards uses Lexile level bands as one measure of text complexity. Text complexity ranges ensure students are college and career ready by the end of 12th grade. Lexile measures help educators scaffold and differentiate instruction as well as monitor reading growth.

Keep in mind when using any leveled text that many students will need scaffolding and support to reach text at the high end of their grade band. According to Appendix A of the Common Core Standards, "It is important to recognize that scaffolding often is entirely appropriate. The expectation that scaffolding will occur with particularly challenging texts is built into the Standards' grade-by-grade text complexity expectations, for example. The general movement, however, should be toward decreasing scaffolding and increasing independence both within and across the text complexity bands defined in the Standards."



The Legend of Bigfoot

Where does the Legend of Bigfoot Come From?

All over the world, for many generations, there have been stories told about a giant, wild man who lives in the forest. The Native Americans called him Sasquatch. In Asia, he is known as the Yeti. The first report of Bigfoot in the United States came from a newspaper in northern California in 1958. It reported that some loggers in the woods had discovered 16-inch footprints that looked like they came from a giant man. Although they never saw the creature, they named him Bigfoot.

From then on, Bigfoot became a national sensation. If something bad happened, like someone disappearing in the woods, they would say that Bigfoot # did it. Any time something happened that could not be explained, they blamed it on this mysterious creature. On the other hand, some people said that he was just a big, harmless man who was traveling through the wilderness. Others claimed that he protected the forest and helped hikers who got lost. In any case, the stories made people very curious and they wanted to see the legendary monster for themselves.

As a result, a popular TV show offered a \$1,000 reward to anyone who could prove Bigfoot was real. The contest inspired many Bigfoot Hunters who tried to find evidence that he existed. People took photographs of mysterious tracks and dark figures. A one-minute video came out that claimed to show a giant, dark creature walking along a creek, but it was very blurry and hard to see well.

Science or Fiction?

However, in 2002, evidence came out that Bigfoot was a hoax. The family of Ray Wallace, who was of one of the loggers who first found evidence of Bigfoot back in 1958, admitted that he had carved giant wooden feet to make fake footprints. Still, people like to believe in Bigfoot. On Labor Day, one town in California has a Bigfoot Daze celebration where impersonators dress up like him and stomp through the streets.

There continues to be thousands of eyewitness accounts. There is even a museum dedicated to Bigfoot. Even Jane Goodall, a well-known and respected scientist of chimpanzees, believes that an apelike man exists.
