



#### Volcano Researchers

Volcanology is a career full of excitement researching some of the world's most complex processes: volcanoes. A special type of geologist called a volcanologist studies volcanoes. These researchers hope to discover new information about volcanoes that will decrease their risk to humans and the environment.



There are different areas of study in volcanology. One area of study collects and studies the lava, rocks, minerals, and gases from volcanoes. Another area measures for stillness or movement in the earth using an instrument called a seismograph. A seismograph gives the user data to make a prediction of future volcanic activity.

Volcanologists can also study how the lava from volcanic eruptions deforms the shape of the earth.

It might sound scary to explore a volcano, but volcanologists actually do not study erupting volcanoes. Instead, volcanologists work on dormant or dead volcanoes. They study the volcano to understand how and why volcanoes erupt, how volcanoes have affected history, and how they can impact humans and the environment in the future. Volcanologists also make predictions about when a volcano will have its next eruption.

If you want to become a volcanologist, you likely find enjoyment in your science and mathematics classes. It is also helpful to know a lot about computers. Volcanologists use a variety of computer programs to study volcanoes. You might also want to see if there are any geology enrichment programs in your area.

Volcanology is a career full of excitement and exploration. But a volcanologist's work is also very important. It can protect the lives of humans and the environment for many generations.
