THE HISTORY BEHIND SALEM

Salem is a historical coastal city in Massachusetts. Salem was originally a Native American village and trading center. The Naumkeag people lived here long before colonists. Puritan colonists migrated to Salem in 1630 in search of religious freedom. Salem became a significant seaport. While Salem has a deep history that spans from indigenous peoples, colonists, and war, it is infamous for a historic event called The Salem witch trials. The Salem witch trials occurred in 1692 when a hysteria hit the city, and over 150 people were accused of witchcraft. Today, the city is best known for the witch trials. Nearly a million tourists visit this city each year, many seeking to experience fictional Halloween and witch related attractions.

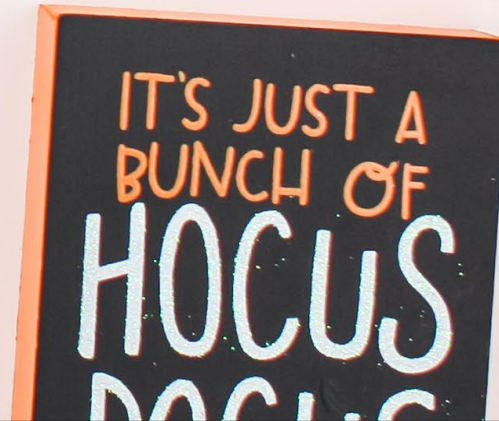
PRIMARY SOURCES
