



The Potomac River is one of the most historic rivers of the United States. Captain John Smith mapped it in 1608 during his explorations. Early settlers relied on the river and discovered that it was a pathway to the Ohio River valley.

George Washington was born on the river's shores in Virginia. His Mount Vernon estate and burial place are on the Potomac River. During the Civil War the Potomac was the dividing line between the North and the South. Soldiers from every war in which the United States has participated, including the American Revolution, are buried in Arlington National Cemetery. This cemetery is located along the Potomac River's route.


Fun Facts!

• George Washington is the only president that did not live in the White House.

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- The address of White House is: 1600
 Pennsylvania Avenue, Washington, D.C.
- There are 412 doors, 28 fireplaces, 32 bathrooms, and 3 elevators in the White House.
- It takes 570 gallons of paint to paint the outside of the building.
- There are about 6,000 visitors every day.
- President Theodore Roosevelt gave the building its official name in 1901.


