5. Reasons Support Points

One way that many people help to slow climate change is by planting gardens in their backyards. This is one small contribution that makes a huge difference! There are several points to consider when planting a garden. First, it is important to plant many native species. This helps continue the relationship between plants and pollinators, such as bees and butterflies, in different parts of the world. Second, it is important to use water carefully. Gardens need to be watered enough to thrive but using too much water is wasteful. Third, families can compost their food scraps to make nutrient-rich soil for their garden. This also helps prevent climate change because it does not contribute to plastic waste from bags of purchased soil. Finally, families can plant as many trees as possible in their backyard to eliminate toxins in the atmosphere. A single tree can absorb as much as one ton of carbon pollution in the air, making it cleaner and healthier for everyone. Imagine what a great impact on the world there would be if everyone planted gardens and trees in their backyards!
