Boston Tea Party

On a cold December night in 1773, three British ships sat in Bostor Harbor. They were filled with tea from the East India Company. The angry colonists of Boston didn't want that tea to be unloaded. The colonists were frustrated with the British government, which had



passed the Tea Act. This was an attempt to force the colonists to buy their tea from the struggling East India Company. The British government was trying to save this company. Other tea companies didn't like this, of course, but the colonists disliked it even more. It was another attempt from the British government to tax them without talking to the colonists first. The Tea Act taxed tea from other companies, but not the tea from the East India Company, making it the cheapest choice. Yes, it was a bargain, but the colonists saw it as another way that the British government was trying to control them. They'd had enough of this treatment.

A group of colonists called the Sons of Liberty decided it was time for things to change. This group included patriots, people in support of colonial independence, such as Samuel Adams and John Hancock. They held a secret meeting and discussed what they could do. They wanted England to know they wanted more freedom to govern themselves.

On December 16th, the Sons of Liberty put on Native American disguises. They boarded the three tea ships in Boston Harbor and dumped 342 chests of tea into the water. The tea company lost a great deal of money, and the rulers in England were furious. The British government went on to punish the colonists by passing the Intolerable Acts. One of these laws closed the port of Boston, cutting the colonists off from important supplies.

The Boston colonists faced many struggles due to the Intolerable Acts. Though not an entirely successful event, the Boston Tea Party showed what the colonists were willing to do in the name of freedom.

Bees are an important part of our natural world. There are about 20,000 different species of bees. The gueen bee, the worker bee, and the drone bee make up a bee community called a colony. While only the queen bee can reproduce, both queen bees and worker bees are female. The queen is in charge of laying eggs. Cleaning the hive, collecting pollen and nectar to feed the colony, and taking care of bee babies are all jobs of the worker bees. Drones are male, and their only job is to mate with the queen.

Known as pollinators, bees help plants survive and reproduce by gathering pollen from various species of flowering plants on their legs and bodies. When they travel from flower to flower, some pollen may rub off from one plant and fall onto the next plant. Now the plant is fertilized and has the potential to make seeds. Making seeds means making more plants. This is called cross-pollination. Bees are attracted to flowers that are brightly colored, fragrant, and tubular in shape. They store the pollen that doesn't get transferred onto plants in specialized pockets on their legs or bodies and carry it back to their hives for food






