After each challenge, place your item in your television set.

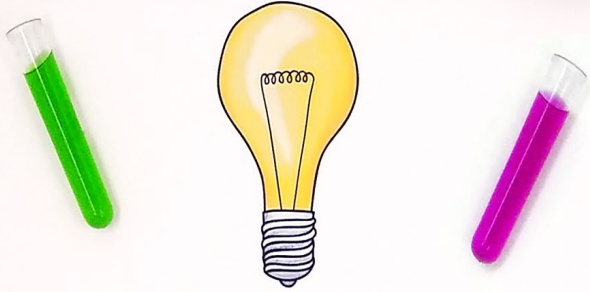
