Reptiles

Reptiles are cold-blooded animals. They don't maintain a steady body temperature. Instead, reptiles sunbathe to stay warm. They don't have to burn energy to keep their bodies warm, either. This means reptiles don't eat as much food as warm-blooded animals. Reptiles have dry, scaly skin. They breathe using lungs. Most reptiles lay eggs on land.

Reptiles live in nearly every kind of habitat. They are found on all continents except Antarctica. They make their homes in deserts, jungles, forests, oceans, and even backyards. Most reptiles are carnivores

swimming. Some turtles even have flippers. Tortoises and turtles don't have teeth. Instead, their mouths are like beaks.

Lizards usually have four legs and a long tail. They shed their skin regularly in bits and pieces. Some lizards, such as chameleons, have skin that changes color. Lizards can live on the ground, in trees, or in burrows. They eat insects and other small mammals. There are almost 6,000 species of lizards, making them the most successful reptiles.

Reptiles have many interesting features. Having them on Earth adds to the variety in nature.




