

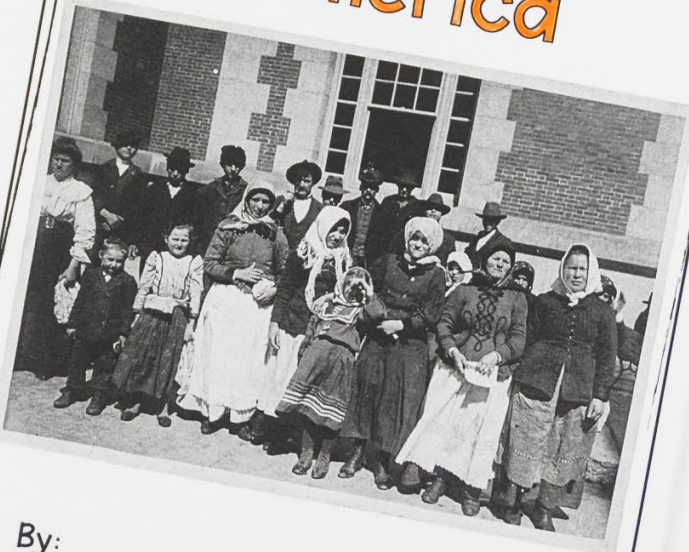

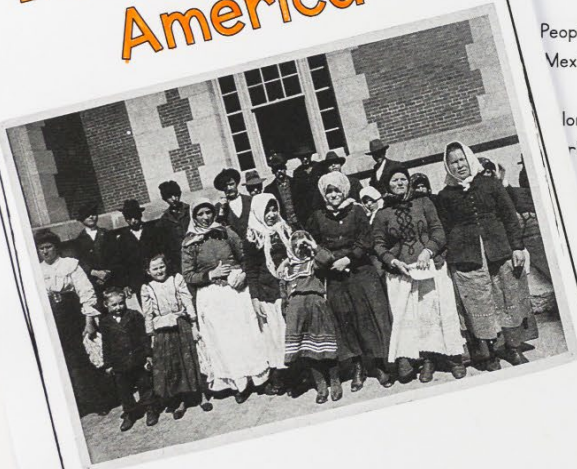

Unit 5: Immigration in America

Preparation:

- Print the vocabulary cards, student books, and worksheets before beginning. Each student will need their own copy of the book and worksheets.
- Picture Book or Read Aloud: *All The Way To America* by Dan Yaccarino
- Prepare your technology to present the PowerPoint presentation and view videos.

Day 1:

Tell students that this unit is about the history of immigration to America. We will be learning about the different reasons people came to America throughout history. Show students the vocabulary cards to introduce key vocabulary words. Distribute the K.W.L. chart. Have students share what they know about immigration. Discuss what students are wondering or want to know. Tell students that at the end of this lesson, they will fill in what they learned.

Day 2:

Distribute the *Immigration in America* book. Tell students that you will be going through a presentation together, and along the way, students will find clues to fill in their books.

Begin the presentation. Review the key vocabulary, and review through slide 8 (A Land of Immigrants). While you go through the presentation, students should fill in their books. Give them time to color the pictures, as well.

Day 3: Review the vocabulary. Complete the presentation slides 9-12 (Slavery).

Day 4: Review the vocabulary. Complete the presentation slides 13-22 (Immigration in America).

Day 5: Complete vocabulary review sheet. Allow students time to complete their books.

Day 6-7: Read aloud the book *All The Way To America* by Dan Yaccarino. (You can also use the YouTube read aloud link provided). Discuss the questions provided during and after the read aloud.

Day 8-9: Introduce the career spotlight: entrepreneur. Read the passage and watch a clip of the video about kid entrepreneurs, the Billingsleas brothers. Break students into groups. Have students come up with a business plan about an entrepreneurial business they would like to begin.

Day 10: Give students the lesson quiz. Finally, work as a class to fill in the "L" portion of the K.W.L. Be sure to discuss any misconceptions students had about immigrants.

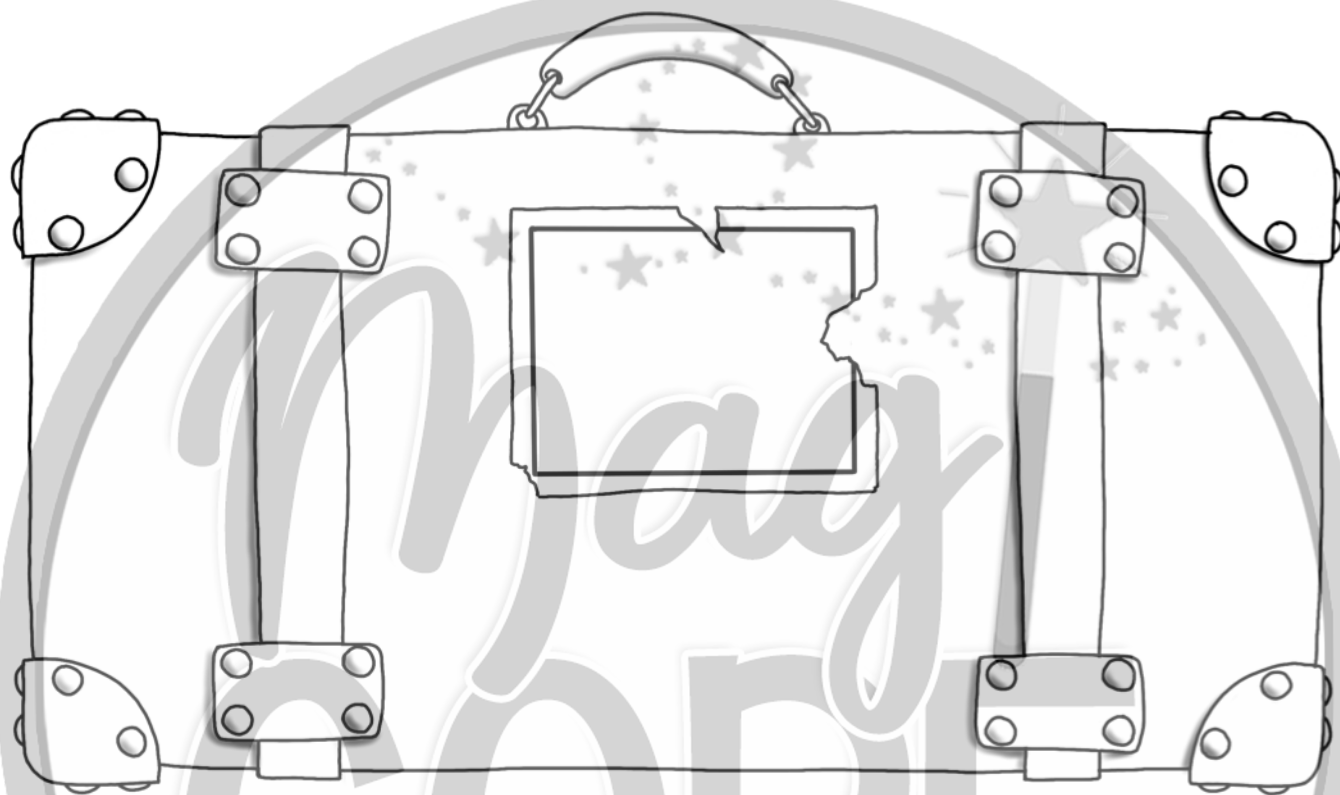

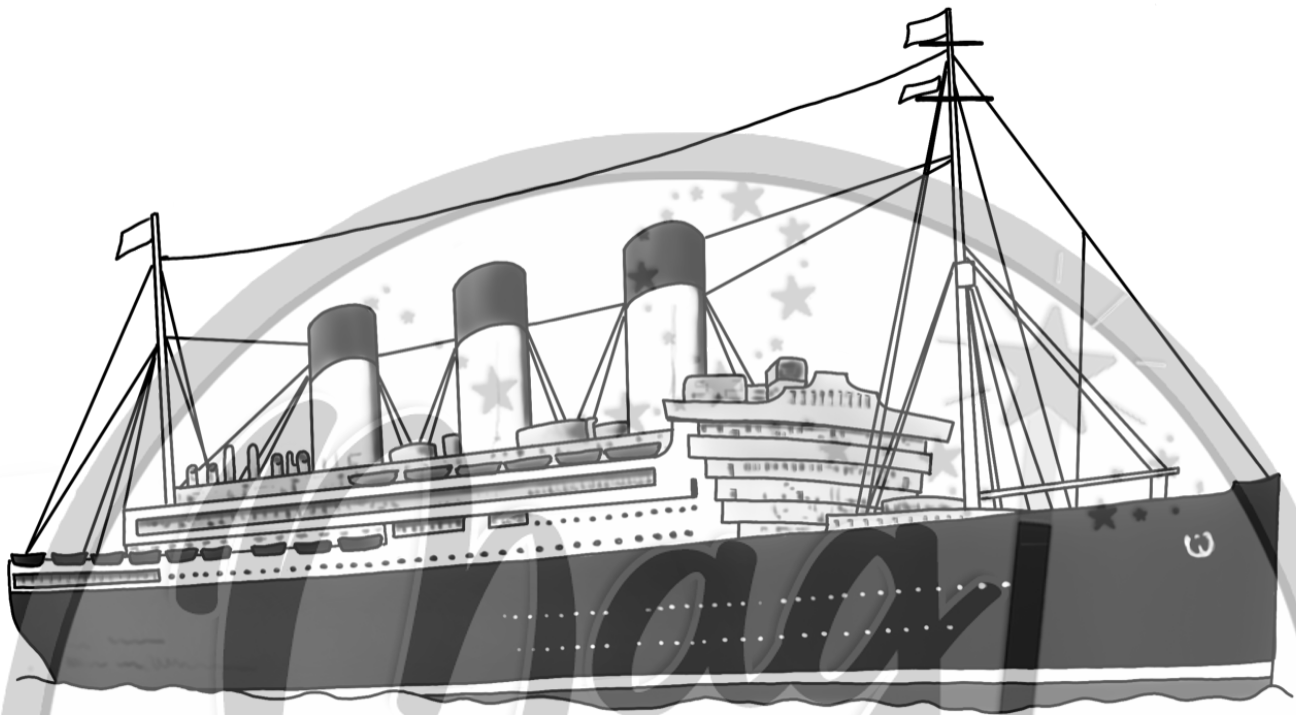
Who Are Immigrants?

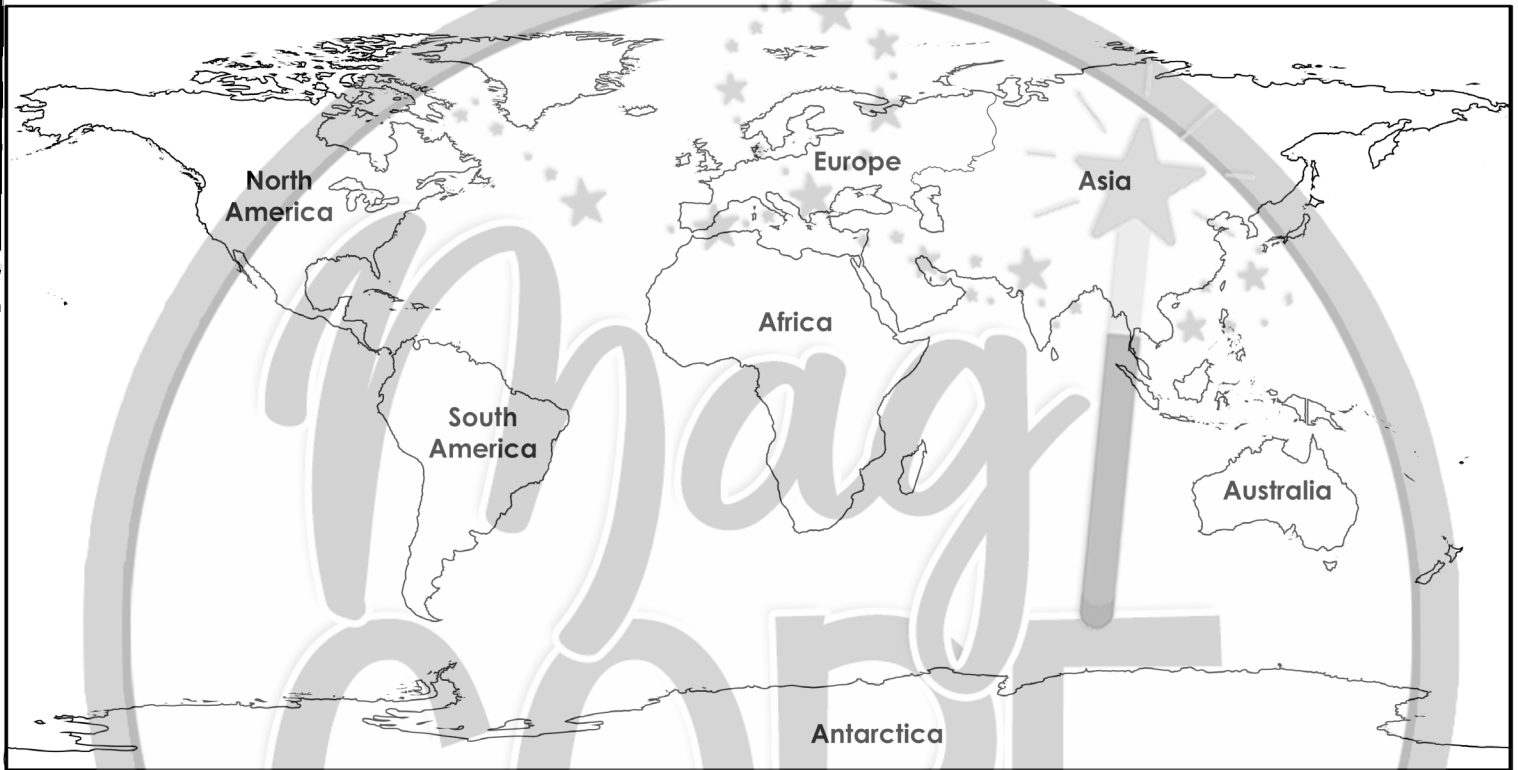
Why Immigrate?

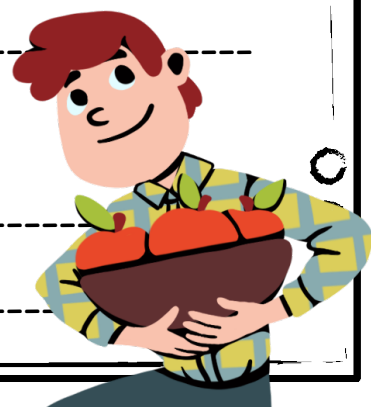

Entrepreneur

Entrepreneurs are people who start a new business. This is often risky, so entrepreneurs are often creative and daring people. Did you know that almost 22% of all businesses started in the United States are started by immigrant entrepreneurs?

Entrepreneurs start by thinking of an idea that solves a problem. Once they have an idea, they make a plan. The plan usually has a timeline with steps they need to take to succeed. The entrepreneur may contact others to support their idea or business by investing time or money.

Many entrepreneurs fail. They lose money and end up closing their business. Some entrepreneurs are successful. Their business earns money, and the person may even become famous.

Entrepreneurs are important. Their ideas, businesses, and inventions solve problems for people. Entrepreneurs are often dreamers. They may see things others do not. Think about some of the amazing technology you use. iPhones would not have been possible without the entrepreneur Steve Jobs. Legos would not have been made if it weren't for Danish carpenter Ole Kirk Kristiansen.
