A dockworker is someone who loads and unloads goods. These goods are carried on a ship. Dockworkers do their jobs in harbors and ports by the water. They operate forklifts, cranes, and other equipment to handle goods. Dockworkers must check each delivery to make sure it's complete. They also inspect containers for damage. After unloading, they sort and load materials on trucks. Keeping records of every shipment is important. Dockworkers work in teams. They must take orders from a dock manager. Often, they use physical strength to carry out those orders.

The hours for a dockworker usually relate to shipping or dock schedules. Shifts often happen during the regular work week. International shipments may need attention at any time, though. Dockworkers work outside in all forms of weather. The working conditions can be risky. Many large vehicles create traffic on site. Sometimes shipments involve hazardous chemicals. 
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Trading With Money

History Of Trade


Today, goods and services are usually purchased (traded with money). It hasn't always been that way. In the past, goods were usually traded for other goods.

For example, for thousands of years, China traded with <u>tea</u>. The










Unit 3 Instructions

Time Commitment

This unit includes 8 days of lessons. It should take about thirty minutes for each social studies lesson.

This resource includes a Google Slides presentation. The presentation can easily be converted to PowerPoint. This presentation is meant to be used as a whole class presentation, rather than a student activity.



Unit 3: Trading Goods and Services

Preparation:

- Print the vocabulary cards, student books, and worksheets before beginning. Each student will need their own copy of the book and worksheets.
- Prepare your technology to present the presentation.

Day I:

Tell students that this unit is about trading goods and services. We will be learning about what trade is, why countries trade with each other, and how trade is possible around the world. Show students the vocabulary cards to introduce key vocabulary words. Distribute the K.W.L. chart. Have students share what they know about trading goods and services. Discuss what students are wondering or want to know. Tell students that they will fill in what they learned at the end of this lesson.

Day 2:

Distribute the *Trading Goods and Services* book. Tell students that you will be going through a presentation together and along the way, they will find clues to fill in their books.

Begin the presentation. Review the key vocabulary and review through slide 6 (History of Trade). While you go through the presentation, students should fill in their books. Give them time to color the pictures, as well.

Day 3: Review the vocabulary. Complete presentation slides 7-12 (Good Around the World).

Day 4: Review the vocabulary. Complete presentation slides 13-16 (Trade Around the World).

Day 5: Review the vocabulary. Complete presentation slides 17-19 (Who Makes Trade Possible?).


Day 6: Read the book *Let's Trade* by Nancy Loewen. You can read this aloud to students or follow along with the linked online read-aloud. After reading, help students make more connections to trading by having them complete the short answer questions with class discussion.

Day 7: Complete the vocabulary sort as a review. Introduce the career spotlight: dockworker.





How to Print Booklet




