Be aware that this is a serious topic. Take time and space to care for your emotions and how this topic impacts you.




The system of slavery began in America as soon as the first Europeans arrived and captured Indigenous People as slaves. Some historians say that the first enslaved Africans arrived in Virginia in 1619, and some say that it was long before. The economies of all 13 colonies relied on the enslavement of Africans and African Americans, but it was more popular in some colonies than others.

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CRITICAL THINKING


Who do you think spoke these words?

Use cut (Ctrl+X) and paste (Ctrl+V) to place your stickers in the correct blue circle on this page.

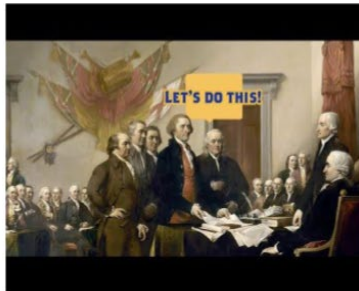

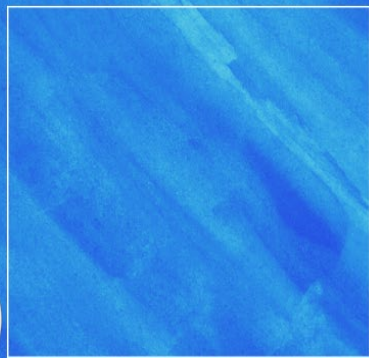
