




Judicial Review

Marbury v. Madison is a legal case from 1803. It was written by Chief Justice John Marshall. It was the first time the court ruled that a law was unconstitutional. The decision secured the power of Judicial Review for the court.



Judicial review is a process where laws can be reviewed by judges. Judges can rule that laws are invalid based on the Constitution. This also means that judges can interpret what the Constitution means whenever it is unclear.

Judicial Opinions


Supreme Court justices do not always agree on the outcomes of a case. They decide cases based on a majority. This means that more justices agree than disagree. They give written opinions. The opinion is their decision about the case.



Unit Instructions

Time Commitment

This unit includes 10 days of lessons. It should take about thirty minutes for each social studies lesson.

This resource includes a Google Slides presentation. The presentation can easily be converted to PowerPoint. This presentation is meant to be used as a wholeclass presentation, rather than a student activity.



Unit 7: The Constitution

Preparation:

- Print the vocabulary cards, student books, and worksheets before beginning. Each student will need their own copy of the book and worksheets.
- Picture Book or Read-Aloud: When the Schools Shut Down by Tamara Pizzoli and Yolanda Gladden.
- Prepare your technology to present the PowerPoint presentation and view the videos.

Day I:

Tell students that this unit is about the Constitution of the United States of America. We will be learning about what the Constitution is and how it affects the people of the United States. Show students the vocabulary cards to introduce key vocabulary words. Distribute the K.W.L. chart. Have students share what they know about the Constitution. Discuss what students are wondering or want to know. Tell students that at the end of this lesson, they will fill in what they learned.

Day 2:

Distribute *The Constitution* book. Tell students that you will be going through a presentation together, and along the way, they will find clues to fill in their books.

Begin the presentation. Review the key vocabulary, and review through slide 5 (The Three Branches of Government). While you go through the presentation, students should fill in their books. Give them time to color the pictures, as well.

Day 3: Review the vocabulary. Complete presentation slides 6-9 (Federalism & Supremacy).

Day 4: Review the vocabulary. Complete presentation slides 10–13 (Judicial Opinions).

Day 5: Review the vocabulary. Complete presentation slides 14-18 (Constitution).

Day 6: Complete vocabulary review sheet. Allow students time to complete their books.

Day 7-8: Read aloud the book *When the Schools Shut Down* by Tamara Pizzoli and Yolanda Gladden. Have the students complete the compare and contrast graphic organizer and complete the questions provided after the read-aloud.

Day 9: Have students observe the "Painting Spotlight." Discuss their observations and allow them to ponder the painting. Then, have students complete the reflection questions.

Day IO: Give students the lesson quiz. Finally, work as a class to fill in the "L" portion of the K.W.L. Be sure to discuss any misconceptions students had about the Constitution.
