
Teacher Instructions

This novel guide was created for the novel *Charlotte's Web* and is divided into SIX sections:






Getting Started!


What Do You Know About Pigs?

One of the main characters in *Charlotte's Web* is a pig named Wilbur! What do you already know about pigs?




The smallest and/or weakest pig in a litter is called the "runt."




Wilbur Wants


