## Tut Hall, Egyptian Museum

Tutankhamun, or King Tut, was the last pharaoh of his family to rule Egypt. He became king at 9 years old and died ten years later at 19. (around 1324 B.C.). King Tut is so well-known around the world due to his long-lost tomb being discovered in 1922, fully intact. Unlike most of the tombs and treasures, it had not been trespassed or looted.

Most of the artifacts buried in King Tut's tomb were moved to the Egyptian Museum in Cairo. The mummified King Tut himself, along with some other items, remain in the tomb for visitors to see.
