And then... it began to rain.

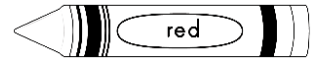

Promptly remove any attached ticks from the body with tweezers without crushing them. Apply pesticides where possible in yards or other outdoor areas. Reducing tick habitats can also help to reduce the risk of Lyme Disease.

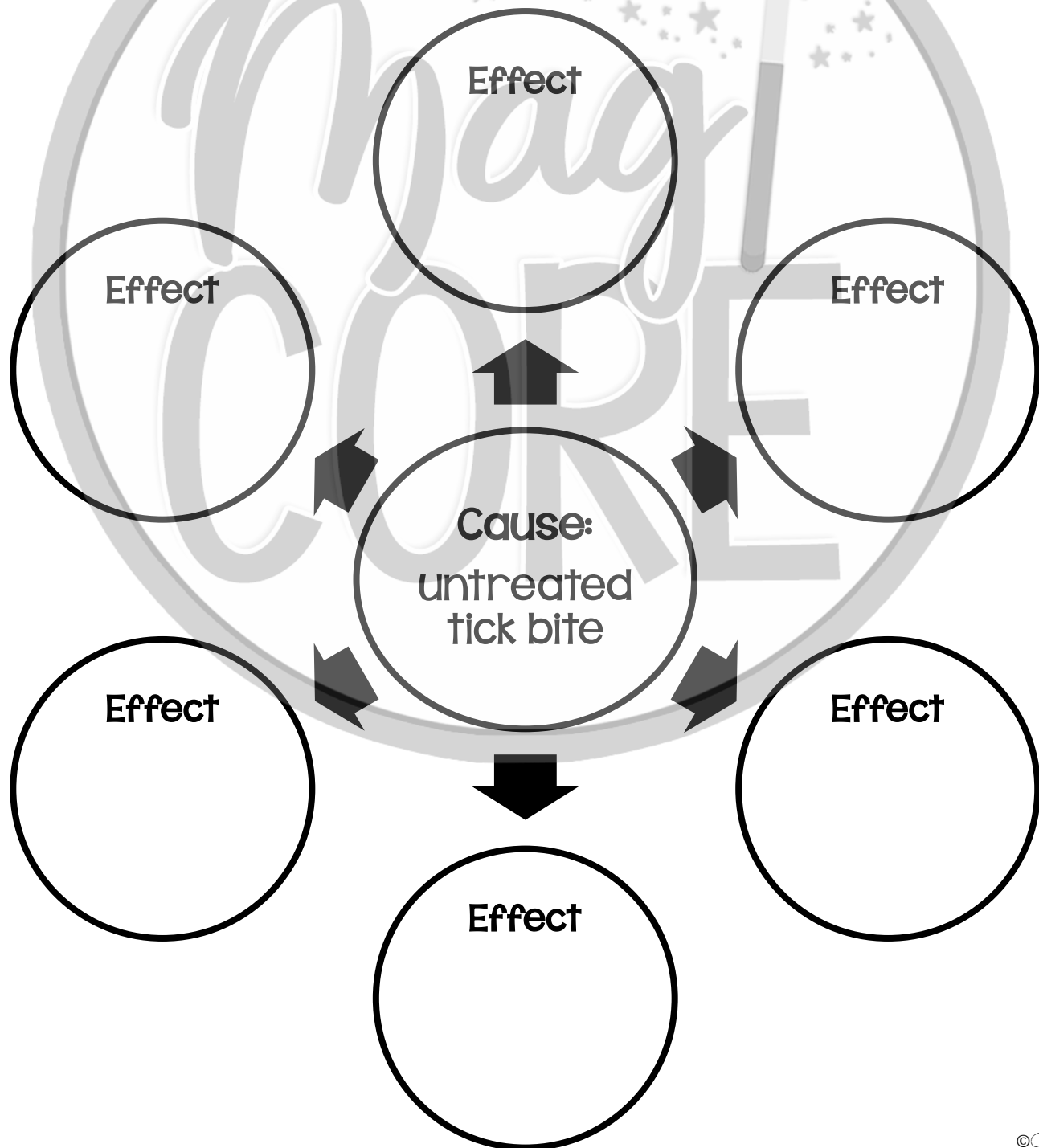
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# CAUSE AND EFFECT

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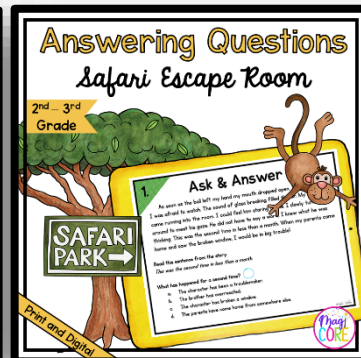
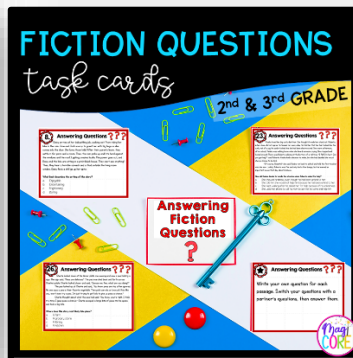


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
